The **Warehouse District Historic Resources Survey** is an architectural survey project. The focus is Albany’s industrial and manufacturing heritage in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. The project goals are to document existing historic buildings and to identify historic districts that could be eligible for listing in the New York and National Registers of Historic Places.

The Project Team is led by the City of Albany’s Department of Planning & Development with consultant Easton Architects and the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation.

### Where is the survey happening?

The survey area follows the recommendations of the Albany Historic Preservation Plan. The Warehouse District was identified as one of 21 “Future Survey Areas” in the Plan, shown on the map below:



The survey area is centered on North Broadway and North Pearl Street corridors and is approximately bounded by Emmet Street on the north, Colonie Street on the south, Erie Boulevard on the east, and a portion of Loudonville Road and Tivoli Street on the west.

- What an intensive-level historic resources survey means.
- What type of information is collected for a historic resources survey.
- What the final products will be and you can access them.
- The New York and National Registers of Historic Places and what it means to be eligible for listing.

- The steps that can follow a historic resources survey—for example, formal nomination to the National Register and eligibility for rehabilitation programs.
- How this project fits into the City’s historic preservation work.
