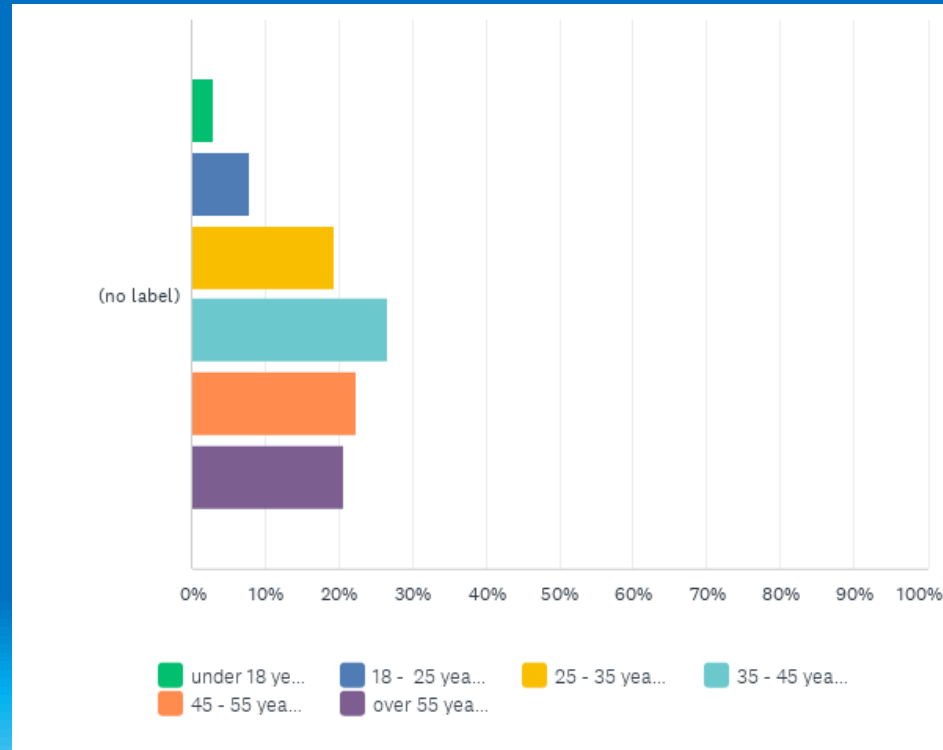

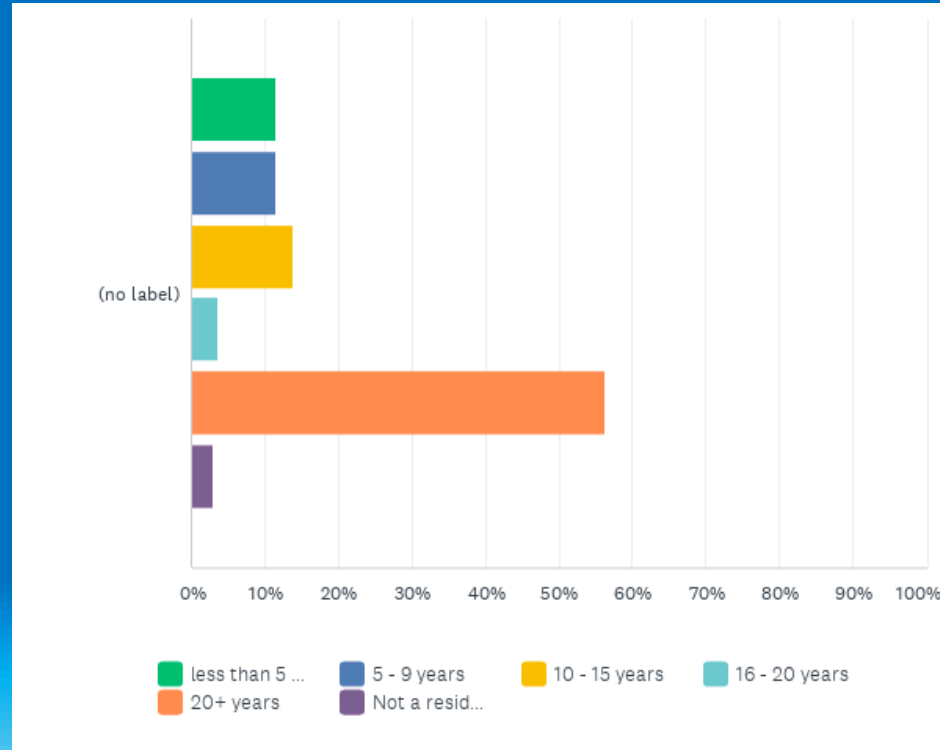

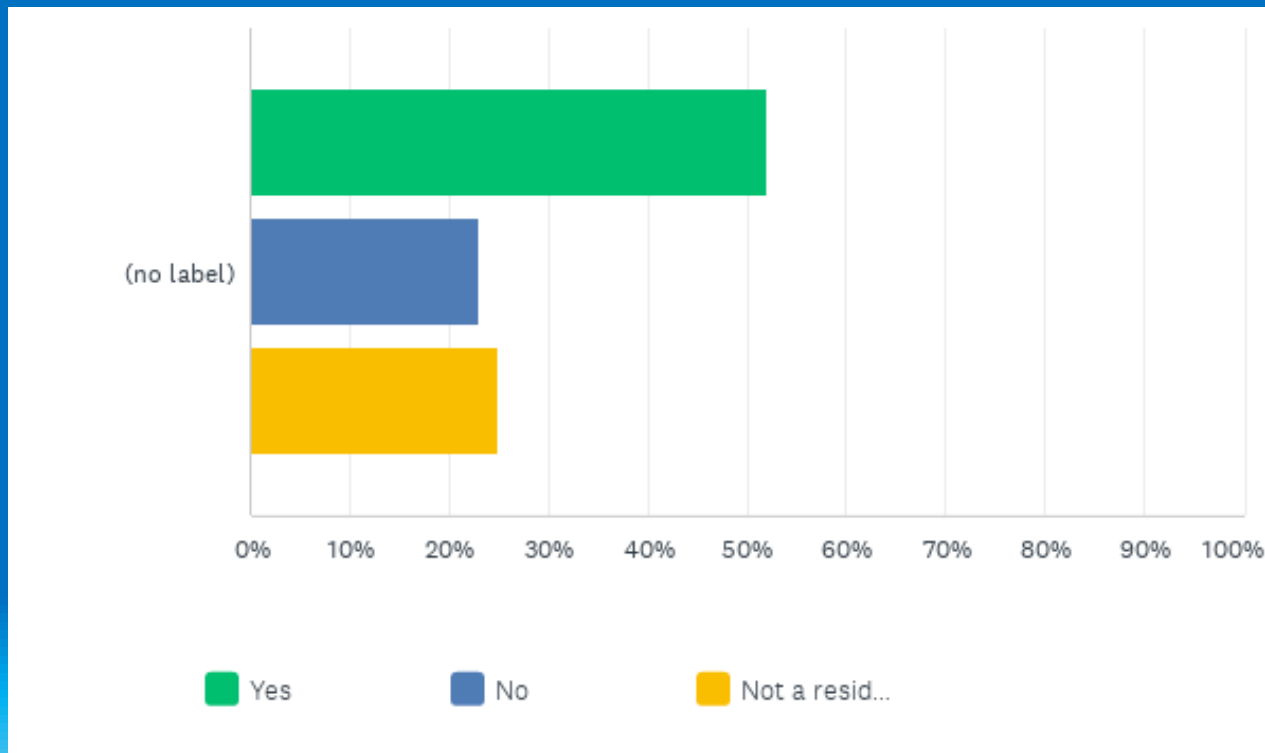
Q1: Please indicate your age range?



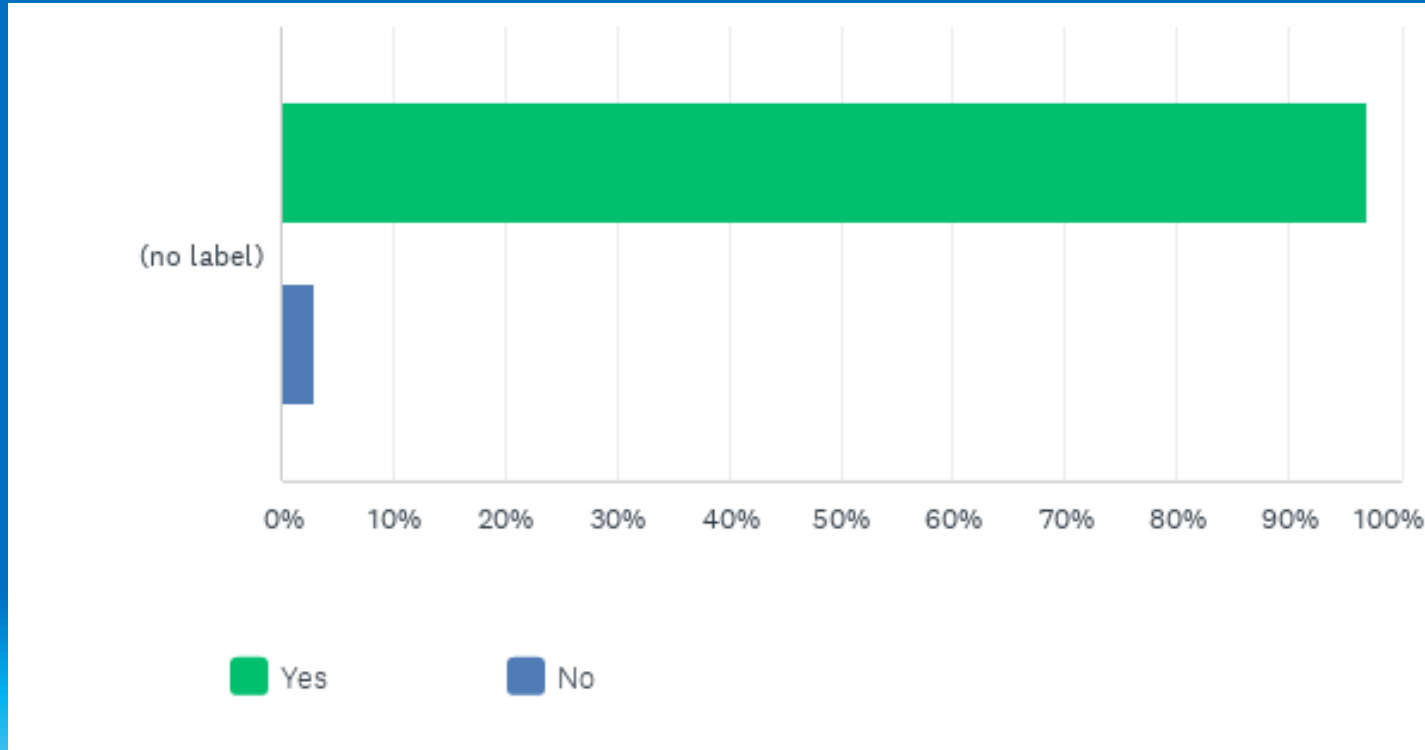
Q2: How long have you been a resident of the City of Albany?



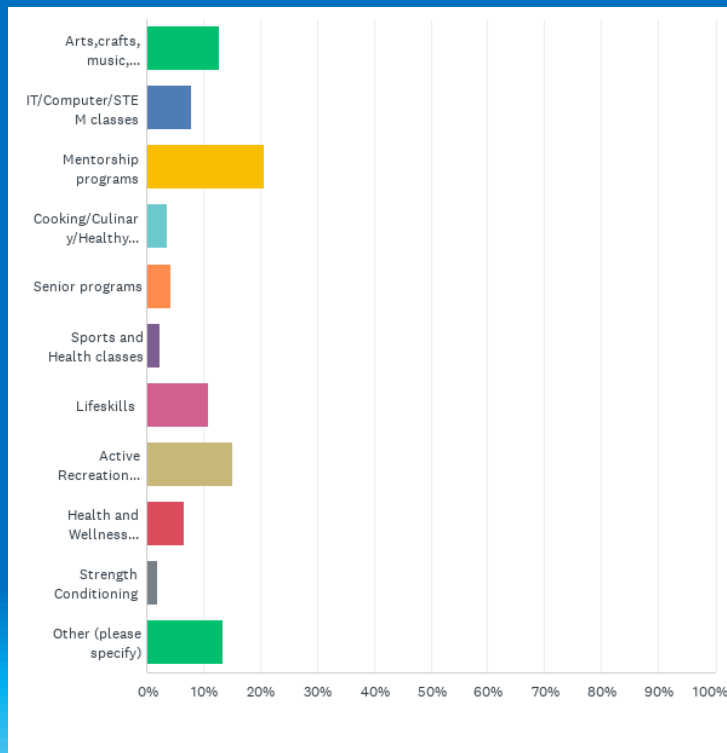
Q3: Do you live within the West Hill neighborhood of the City of Albany?



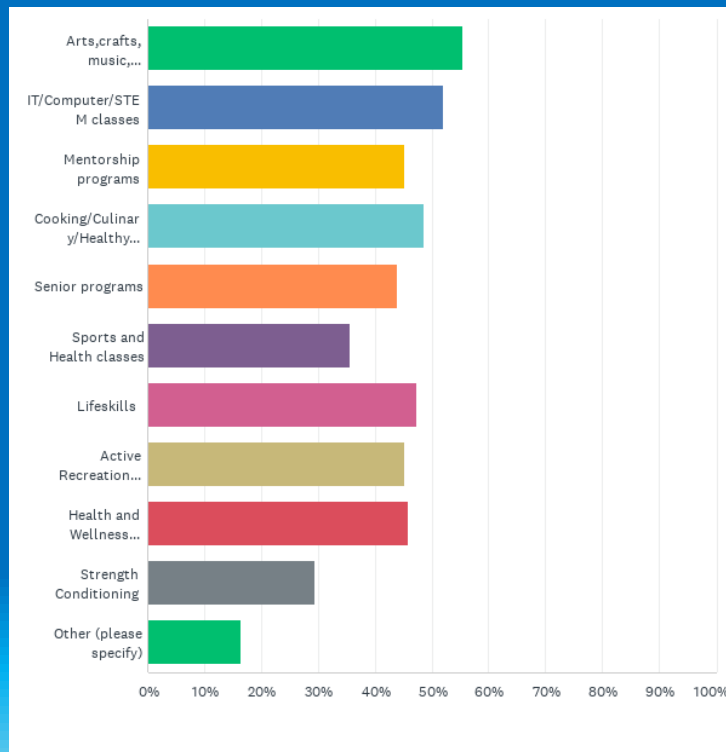
Q4: Do you support the need for a Community Center within the West Hill neighborhood of the City of Albany?



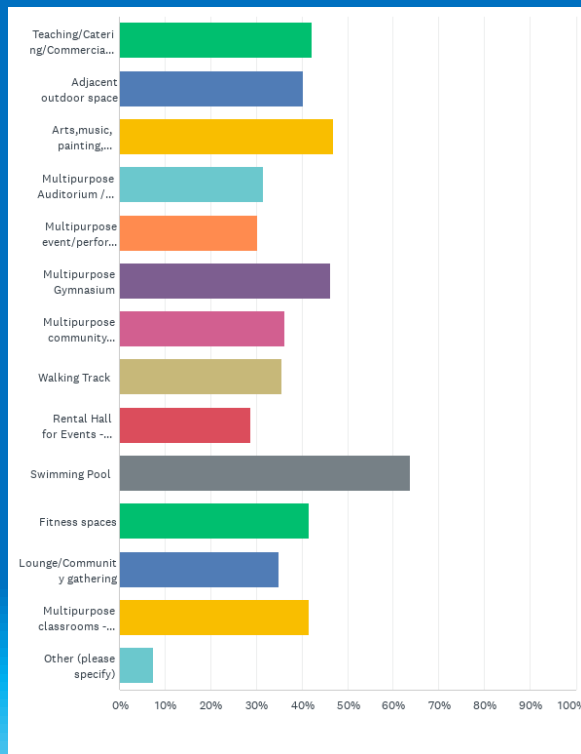
Q5: What additional activities and programs do you feel is most important to be offered at a new Community Center within the West Hill neighborhood of the City of Albany? (Choose one)



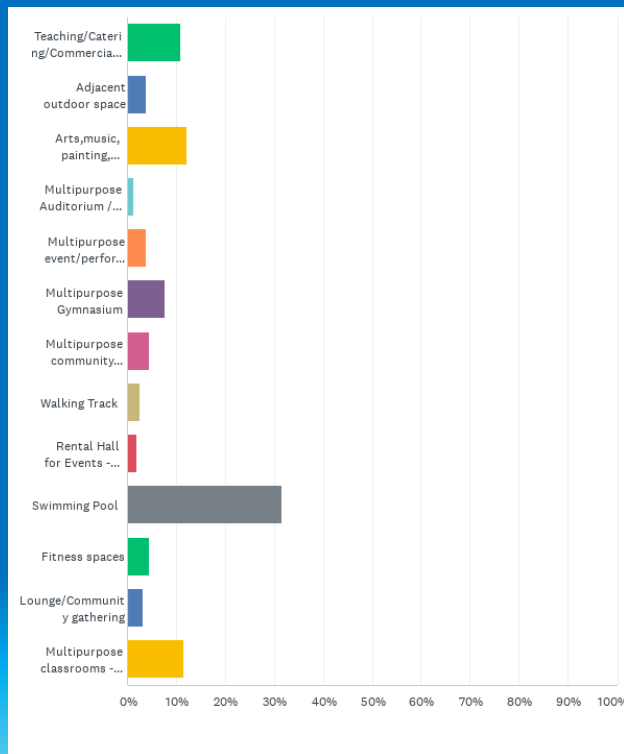
Q6: What additional activities and programs do you feel should be offered at a new Community Center within the West Hill neighborhood of the City of Albany? (Choose all that apply)
